





SPIRIT AWARD HONOREE

PAULA BASTA



This year, we are thrilled to present the 2023 Spirit Award to honoree Paula Basta, Director of the Illinois Department on Aging. The Spirit Award is presented each year to an individual in the field of aging services who demonstrates CMSS' core values – dignity, respect, compassion, and equality. In her remarkable career, Paula has been a tireless advocate for improving the lives of older adults.

Governor JB Pritzker appointed Paula Basta as Director of the Illinois Department on Aging in March of 2019. She became the 13th director, and seventh woman to lead the agency. As a lifelong advocate for senior citizens, Paula brings her institutional knowledge of senior services, policy, and social justice to lead the Department.

Paula has more than 40 years of experience working with older adults. The first 20 years of Paula's career were spent in the not-for-profit sector with organizations such as Little Brothers – Friends of the Elderly; St. Clement Catholic Church; and Housing Opportunities and Maintenance for the Elderly (H.O.M.E.). While at H.O.M.E, Paula was named Executive Director following the retirement of its founders. She remained in that role for five years before embarking on a 20-year career in Government.

Paula's governmental experience began with the City of Chicago's Department on Aging as the Director of Information and Assistance. Paula then transitioned within the City of Chicago Department on Aging to begin a 14-year career as the Regional Director of the Northeast (Levy) Senior Center. Her most recent position prior to joining IDoA was with the Chicago Housing Authority as the Director of Senior Services and Health Initiatives. While serving as Director of Senior Services and Health Initiatives, Paula oversaw social services for 54 senior buildings and 10,000 seniors throughout Chicago.



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

Letter to Supt. Isabelle Reeves, 1900

Letter to Supt. Isabelle Reeves, recommending resident, 1900

CMSS was founded by Alice Hartwell in 1898. Alice's purpose in founding the organization was to provide a place for "elderly women" in her congregation to live. This letter, from 1900, is from her church's reverend at the time, informing CMSS' Superintendent that a woman from the church was seeking a home. At this time in history it was common for houses of worship to establish ways to care for their elders.

Letter from Donor to Supt. Isabelle Reeves, 1913

This letter from our archives (stapled with a nail) was written by Mrs. R.H. Stroede to CMSS Supt. Reeves. At the time, Mrs. Stroede had a system of donating canned fruit to CMSS. Once the fruit was eaten, Supt. Reeves would send back the empty cans to be refilled. Other letters from the time reveal donors providing dozens of eggs, gifts for the holidays, and also cash.

Resident game night, circa 1940

This photo of residents playing checkers and other board games was likely taken in the 1940s. The residents are seated in what was then called Kent Hall on Foster Avenue. The redevelopment that resulted in today's current construction on Foster was done in 1974 to create additional space for residents and community.

A group of residents are seen here knitting and enjoying the sunshine. Throughout our history, CMSS has offered a variety of engaging activities for residents. Today we offer music and art therapy programs that are designed to benefit residents living with dementia.

CMSS nurses at lunch, circa 1960

These nurses are wearing white caps in various styles which was common for uniforms of the times. Before the 1970s, nurses wore white caps which signified the nursing school they attended or their level of educational achievement.

Though the make and model has changed, our CMSS van remains an essential part of our services. We provide residents with transportation to appointments, and also use it to take residents on small field trips to scenic areas of Chicago.

In this photo, a resident performs a seated exercise with two young women. Chair exercises, like chair yoga, include modified movements that improve strength and range of motion. Today we still use chair yoga in several CMSS locations.





Eye doctors at CMSS, circa 1970

In the late 1960s, CMSS established programs for providing healthcare to the local community. The "Community of Services" as we called it, offered clinical ophthalmology, podiatry, dental, and hearing services to individuals in the neighborhood. This temporary expansion of services was meant to address a need in the area.

The CMSS team would not be complete without our dining staff who ensure residents receive healthy and fresh daily meals. Today our dining staff takes into consideration the various dietary needs of each resident in our care.

Volunteers landscaping on Foster Avenue, 1972

As a non-profit organization, CMSS has always depended on dedicated and generous volunteers to make our work possible. These eight men undertook landscaping tasks on Foster Avenue, on the north face of Wesley Place. The new hall featured a medical center and skilled nursing wing, as well as additional space for residents.

This photo shows CMSS residents petting a feline visitor. Animal visits can be relaxing and joyful events for residents and family members, especially animal-lovers. Today we often have therapy dogs visit our communities.





Construction of Affordable Senior Housing, 1989

In 1990, CMSS opened the doors of the Winwood Apartments, establishing our first Affordable Senior Housing building in Andersonville, Chicago. Creating affordable housing for older adults was a high priority for CMSS as we expanded our continuum of care in the nineties.

West Suburban Senior Services has provided resources and programming for older adults for more than 50 years. In 2019, West Suburban became a part of CMSS' continuum of care.

CMSS has offered home care services since the late nineties. Today our SASI (Serving Adults. Supporting Independence.) Home Care program provides personalized care to older adults in their homes, in assisted living communities, and even in nursing homes when needed.
